Introduction

The largely flat landscape of Thanet makes walking and cycling a breeze. With many tourist attractions, Blue Flag beaches, retail outlets, cafés and bars, Thanet is a great all season tourism destination.

Getting around

Cycling is often the fastest, always the healthiest and, apart from walking, the most environmentally sustainable form of transport. Cycling has many benefits for both the individual cyclist and society as a whole. For

journeys up to 3 miles cycling is usually the fastest way of getting from A to B. The current cycle network in Thanet links the three main towns of Margate, Broadstairs and Ramsgate.

Take a close look at your map and see how easy it is to get from your home to the station, school or town centre.

Walking and cycling aren't just a rewarding and fun way to get around town - switching from using the car for some trips will reduce climate change emissions and saves you a lot of money, it also allows you to integrate some healthy activity into your daily routine, helping you lose weight and get fitter.

Thanet is also well served by mainline train stations and bus routes, including the Thanet Loop running every **8 minutes** during peak time.

Leisure walking and cycling

Aside from the two main tourist routes mentioned there are numerous promenades and parks to enjoy some healthy exercise. If you are feeling less energetic, both routes can be broken into bite size pieces using the frequent train or bus services to get back to your start point.

More adventurous cyclists can connect to National Cycle Route 1 at Sandwich by diverting off the Viking Coastal Trail and following dedicated cycle routes around Pegwell Bay. The charming medieval town of Sandwich is well worth a visit. From Reculver, the Oyster Bay Trail can be picked up to continue around the north Kent coast.

All public rights of way are shown on the map. Walkers can use all the routes and cyclists are permitted to use bridleways, restricted byways and byways, although not all are suitable for cycling.


The Viking Coastal Trail

Fact File

Distance: 43.5km (27 miles) but take your pick of any part of it!

Terrain: Mostly flat with a few sharp hills, two thirds of the route is off road, ideal for family outings.

Signed throughout: Viking Coastal Trail/National Route 15



Whether you're an experienced cyclist or a novice, you'll find plenty to enjoy along the 27 mile (43.5km) route on the Isle of Thanet peninsular, the point where Vikings first landed in Britain.

The coastal section from Pegwell Bay to Reculver winds its way past sandy beaches and bays, often against a backdrop of spectacular chalk cliffs. Ramsgate and Margate are lively seaside resorts, but it's hard to beat the nostalgic charm of Broadstairs.

The inland loop is on quiet lanes, taking in pretty Kentish villages with ancient churches and passing Minster Abbey, one of England's oldest inhabited buildings founded in 670AD.

If you don't want to undertake the whole route, try the 9 mile traffic-free stretch that follows the seawall from Margate to Reculver.

You can join this well-signed route on the promenade directly opposite Margate train station. Along the promenade to Westgate-on-Sea you'll find plenty of distractions, with slopes and steps to the cliff tops and down to the beaches and rock pools.

The only on-road section takes you along the cliff from Westgate-on-Sea to Epple Bay where you rejoin the promenade. You can avoid the road by cutting across the foreshore, but cyclists will have to carry their bikes - and risk

getting their feet wet if they get the tide wrong! Minnis Bay is popular with swimmers, as well as sailors, windsurfers and sea canoeists. From here the scenery changes with striking views of the flat marshland as you approach Reculver, a few miles east of Herne Bay.



The route is also known as Regional Cycle Network (RNCN) 15 and well signed throughout with the trail logo and NCN symbol.

Points of interest

Pugins Grange, St Augustine's Road, Ramsgate

The Grange is a grade I listed building that was designed and lived in by Augustus Pugin, the 19th century architect. It was recently restored by the Landmark Trust, a building preservation charity and is now available for holidays throughout the year.

Minster Abbey, Church Street, Minster

Possibly the oldest inhabited house in the country. The first English monastery was founded on the Abbey site in 670AD by Ermenburga, granddaughter of St Ethelbert.

The Viking Ship "Hugin", Sandwich Road, Ramsgate

Situated on the cliff top at Pegwell Bay, this replica Viking Ship sailed from Denmark to Thanet in 1949 to celebrate the 1500th anniversary of the landing of Hengist and Horsa.

Royal Harbour and Marina, Ramsgate

Designed by Smeaton and Rennie, the two big names in Georgian marine engineering, the outline of the harbour remains essentially unchanged from that of 1793.

Joss Bay, Joss Gap Road, Broadstairs

Joss Snelling the notorious smuggler is named after this bay. He was born in 1741 and plied his "trade" in Thanet. Active till late in his life, he was fined £100 for smuggling at the age of 89! However, despite the deportations and hangings of many of his accomplices, Snelling avoided either fate, and at the time of his death, aged 96, he had achieved celebrity status for his dangerous deeds. He was even introduced to the future Queen Victoria as the "famous Broadstairs smuggler"!

Margate Main Sands and Seafont, Margate

A great stretch of golden, sandy beach on one side with amusement arcades, candy floss and ice cream stalls on the other, all overlooked by Margate's landmark clock tower.

Turner Contemporary, Marine Drive, Margate

Opened on the 16th April 2011, this landmark gallery, designed by Stirling Prize winner David Chipperfield, offers a stimulating programme of events, exhibitions and learning opportunities. Situated on Margate's seafont, on the same site where Turner stayed when visiting the town, the gallery is the largest exhibition space in the South East, outside of London.

The Turner and Dickens Walk



The Turner and Dickens walk connects Margate and Broadstairs. It is named in recognition of the two towns' respective links with the world renowned artist JMW Turner and author Charles Dickens. It is a four mile signposted route with distinctive black and white signs and can be walked in either direction and is designed to be accessible for all.

Much of the walk is based on the ancient path linking St Peter's Church, Broadstairs with St John's Church in Margate. It combines urban and rural Thanet, starting and finishing at the two harbours which date back to the Tudor period, one facing north and the other east.

A key feature of the walk is art inspired by Turner and Dickens. Mosaic panels have been installed in each town. Broadstairs mosaic artist, Martin Cheek, worked with children from two schools close to the walk to create the mosaics.
